Counseling - When to Make a Referral

Deciding whether to refer a member to professional counseling or to try and handle the issue within the ward can be a fine line. When in doubt, call your local LDS Family Services office and consult with a therapist free of charge. Be sensitive to the spirit. Remember that if you refer to a professional, you may continue to play a major role in the person's healing.

With abuse cases, ALWAYS call the church Abuse Help Line 1-800-453-3860, ext. 21911. The following is a list of some of the most common reasons to refer a member to counseling.

• Depression:

- The person has suicidal ideations.
- The person has been depressed for years.
- The person is not medicated for depression and has been depressed for over 6 months.
- The person has suffered a great loss in their life and is not "moving on" after 6 months.
- The person could benefit from learning coping skills to deal with depression.

Sexual Addiction:

- The person has a long-standing habit history of pomography and/or masturbation (2 or more years; doesn't need to be this long).
- The person has acted out sexually with other individuals.
- Any sign or indication that there are minors involved.
- The person has tried kicking the habit on his/her own using prayer, scripture study and church attendance.
- o The person's spouse has found out and is considering separation and/or divorce.
- A young man/woman is getting ready for a mission and has confessed having a problem with pornography and/or masturbation.

· Marital problems:

- There has been cheating.
- o There are major communication problems.
- o There are intimacy problems.
- There are money management problems.
- There are in-law problems.
- The marriage is ending (consider a referral to divorce mediation).

Children & Adolescents:

- Children are sexually acting out inappropriately on a continual basis.
- Adolescents are involved in substance usage.
- o Adolescents are sexually active.
- Parent/child problems.

Pre-mission Evaluation:

- Perspective members desiring to serve a full-time mission but have a history of mild to moderate psycho-social problems. Examples include: ADHD; Asperger's Syndrome; Tourettes Syndrome; behavioral problems
- A summary of the evaluation will be completed by the therapist and submitted to the bishop. This evaluation will accompany the missionary's paperwork to the missionary department.
- There is no charge for a pre-mission evaluation.
